

CENTRELINK CONCESSIONS

Centrelink issues three types of concession and health care cards that provide a range of benefits to cardholders.

HEALTH CARE CARD

A Health Care Card entitles you to a reduction in the cost of medicines under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS). You may also be entitled to a limited number of extra concessions from state and local government authorities. Health Care Card concessions vary from state to state and some of these extra concessions are also available to your dependants.

Concessions from state and local government authorities may include reductions in:

- health care costs including ambulance, dental care and eye care
- public transport costs
- rates
- energy and electricity bills.

How do I qualify for a Health Care Card?

You can get a Health Care card for up to one year if you get any of the following payments:

- ABSTUDY Living Allowance
- <u>Austudy</u>
- JobSeeker Payment
- Parenting Payment partnered
- Special Benefit
- Youth Allowance.

You can also get a card for up to one year if you get any of the following payments:

- <u>Carer Allowance</u> for a child younger than 16 the card is for the child in your care only
- Carer Payment for short term or irregular care less than 6 months
- the maximum rate of Family Tax Benefit Part A
- <u>Mobility Allowance</u> if you're not getting <u>Disability Support Pension</u>.

You must also live in Australia and meet the residence rules of that payment.

If you get <u>Carer Payment</u>, your card is valid for a period of 26 weeks. But only if you get it for episodic or short term care for a child.

PENSIONER CONCESSION CARD

A Pensioner Concession Card entitles you to a reduction in the cost of some medicines as well as other concessions. These may include:

- bulk billing for doctor's appointments (this is your doctor's decision)
- cheaper medicine under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme
- higher Medicare benefits for eligible services once you meet your annual Medicare Safety Net threshold
- assistance with hearing services through the Hearing Services Program
- discounted mail redirection through Australia Post.

Concessions from state and local government authorities may include:

- reductions in property and water rates
- reductions in utility bills
- reduced fares on public transport
- reductions on motor vehicle registration
- free rail journeys.

How do I qualify for a Pensioner Concession Card?

To qualify for a Pensioner Concession Card you must receive one of the following payments:

- A Social Security pension such as Age Pension or Disability Support Pension
- Jobseeker Payment or Youth Allowance and you are single, caring for a dependent child and looking for work
- Parenting Payment (single)
- Carer Payment

You also qualify if you are aged over 55 and have been receiving one or a combination of the following payments for more than nine months:

- Jobseeker Payment (formerly the Newstart Allowance)
- Parenting Payment (partnered)
- Special Benefit

Please note the above list is subject to change.

COMMONWEALTH SENIORS HEALTH CARD

A Commonwealth Seniors Health Card helps you access cheaper prescription medicines if you are of Age Pension age but do not qualify for the Age Pension.

How do I qualify for a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card?

To qualify for a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card (CSHC) you must:

- be Age Pension age
- be an Australian resident living in Australia
 - not be getting an <u>income support payment</u> from Centrelink or the Department of Veterans' Affairs
- provide Centrelink with your Tax File Number (TFN) or be granted an exemption
 - o meet identity requirements
- have an adjustable taxable income of less than:
- \$95,400 (single)
- \$152,640 (couples combined)
- \$190,800 (couples combined who are separated by illness or respite care). Additionally, two people have an interdependency relationship if they have a close personal relationship but do not satisfy the other requirements of an interdependency relationship because either or both of them suffer from a disability.

The definition of adjustable taxable income (ATI) used for CSHC includes:

- taxable income
- reportable fringe benefits
- foreign income
- tax-exempt foreign income
- total net investment losses
- reportable super contributions
- certain tax free pensions or benefits

The limit is increased by \$639.60 for each dependant child in your care.

Dependants of Commonwealth Seniors Health Cardholders are not eligible for concessions using the cardholder's card.
